Tax Payments

A Tax Payments Policy is in place for paying your tax bill online, in person, over the phone, or by mail:

Online payments can be done if you bank with a Credit Union or Caisse bank. Each roll number must be entered separately when doing online payments. If you pay one large sum to one roll number, that payment will ONLY be applied to that roll number.

When mailing in a cheque, please provide the tax bill stub from the bottom of your tax bill. If you own more than one property, include each stub from each bill.

If paying in person, the RM office accepts cash, cheque, debit, or credit card payments. A 2% charge is required on all credit card payments. Make sure to bring all your tax bills you received. If you do not have them, it is your responsibility to know how many roll numbers you have.

Credit card payments can be received over the phone and will require the 2% charge. Let us know your roll number(s) and the amount you want on your account. All receipts are mailed and/or given to you at the time of payment. Please notify the RM if your address has changed.

RM HIGHLIGHTS

RM Summer Project – Summer is almost done and the RM has been busy completing a number of road maintenance operations over the past two months. We are pleased with the asphalt improvement completed in Woodridge, greatly extending the useful life of our asphalt road infrastructure. Municipal roads are receiving their annual mowing, what an improvement in appearance and for safety. Most of our annual graveling is also completed for 2019.

RM Lobbying Efforts - The Council continues to lobby on behalf of our ratepayers. Some of the topics over the summer months included: road impacts and community disruptions resulting from Canadian National Railways ongoing track maintenance and operations program. The RM has voiced concerns regarding the lack of mowing along our Provincial Roads. Inadequate maintenance on PR404 has been brought forward on a number of occasions with the Province; the condition of this road at times has made it difficult to travel. The RM has also addressed illegal waste dumping on Crown Land with our regional Environment Officer. On August 22nd, the Environment Officer inspected one of these known dumping sites. Ratepayers are encouraged to voice their concerns to Council; the RM will forward the concerns to the appropriate provincial department having oversight.

Manitoba – Minnesota Transmission Line Working Group – Ongoing lobbying efforts to secure funding for the Manitoba – Minnesota Transmission Line have seen little progress over the last two months. The RM's efforts will continue in the upcoming months with the recent announcement of final approval for the construction of the transmission line. Seniors Care Facility – The RM of Piney, along with its partners East Borderland Community Housing and the Piney Regional Chamber of Commerce have agreed to investigate the feasibility of Supportive Housing which would service Southeast Manitoba. The group continues to explore innovative ways of providing better housing options for the seniors within the region and improve the quality of life for those residing in the RM.

Building Sustainable Communities Grant — The RM of Piney and the RM of Stuartburn have successfully secured joint funding for the promotion and development of economic and social growth within the southeast region. The goal of this initiative is to improve upon and provide a foundation for prospering, stable communities where families can call home. Some major components of the project include: investigation into potential economic opportunities, the research and development of community profile material to help market our region and foster regional investment. Youth retention and engagement is a key component of the project, with dedicated effort to providing opportunities to youth with the region. The final stage of the project will involve marketing our region and increasing awareness of the economic potential which exist in Southeast Manitoba.

AMM Eastern District News - Councillor Melanie Parent was elected Eastern District representative at the 2019 June District Meeting. Councillor Parent has and will continue to advocate on issues affecting not only the RM of Piney, but many others affecting our neighboring municipalities throughout the eastern region. The upcoming Provincial Election is certainly a topic of discussion, as AMM launches the new "Partners in Growth" initiative. You can follow AMM's social media posts throughout the campaign by following the AMM on Facebook or Twitter. Other initiatives include the availability of funding for Manitoba 150 community events. Finally, AMM continues to provide opportunities for its members to better understand Manitoba's Shared Health plan, the most recent information is the Shared Health Summary Document. Work is now underway to incorporate feedback and to finalize models of care that will meet the needs of the population while ensuring sustainability and consistency into the future in areas like human resources and digital health.

COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT



Badger



In 1900, Badger was originally a community surrounding a railway station along the Manitoba and Southern Railway. Many settlers were immigrants from central Europe and the British Isles. For \$10 a homesteader could buy 160 acres. They then had three years to clear 10 acres and receive a patent for the land. Many of these settlers were unprepared for such wild, forested land. The timber cleared was used to build a house and farm buildings, to sell as firewood, pulpwood and railway ties. The timber was shipped to Winnipeg via the railway. Settlers also trapped and hunted for extra income.

In the early days, the town boasted three grocery stores, a post office, a dance hall, school house, and station houses. The Badger General Store, built in 1908, is still standing and is now a seasonal residence.

Blueberries were also a big part of Badger's economy. Blueberries were picked by locals, and sold by the basket in local stores. Some were even shipped to Winnipeg via train.

With the emergence of better roads, people came from far and wide to pick blueberries – some from the United States. On a single day in July of 1950, there were over 100 cars that came to the area to pick blueberries. It was said that the frequent wildfires in the area made the blueberry crop especially good. Locals still don't give away their best patches.

The town is now the largest it has ever been with a total of 81 lots. However, most of its residents are seasonal. They enjoy berry picking, the quietness of the pines and hunting. Community events include Badger Days on September long weekend, the community quad run on May long weekend, and most recently established is the lawn dart tournament held on July long weekend.

BE FIRESMART!

Around the yard...





- Prune evergreen branches 2 metres from the ground;
- Remove all twigs, dry grass, logs and leaves around the yard;
- Regularly mow and water grass;
- Place fire pits away from trees and overhanging branches:
- Store firewood piles at least 10 metres from any structure.

On the home...



- Choose a fire resistant roofing material (asphalt, metal or clay);
- Clean your gutters of debris regularly;
- Use a spark arrestor and clean your chimney regularly;
- Choose siding such as metal, stucco, brick/concrete, or fibre cement board;
- Remove all debris from underneath decks and stairways and enclose with fire resistant material.

In the home...



• Test your smoke & carbon monoxide detectors once a month and replace batteries at least once a year.
