# St. Labre




Homesteading in St. Labre began in the early 1900's by French people coming from Quebec and France. Settlers made a living by logging wood for the CN railway, farming or trapping. In 1900 a sawmill was built and called "Mill of the North", which employed many people. Cream from the farms was also shipped to the Woodridge creamery via train.

The church in St. Labre was built in 1928 and still runs services. St. Labre also had one store (that closed in 1968), a post office, school, and a privately run Credit Union. In 1966 the school closed and children went to La Broquerie or Woodridge.

Baseball used to be a major sport in St. Labre. There were tournaments and teams. However, as St. Labre got bigger, the small-time community fun faded into larger-scale events. St. Labre 200, the 'award winning' go-kart building and racing competition which takes place every July at Moonshadow Holsteins farm. This event is the biggest in the RM, and perhaps the biggest of its kind in southeastern Manitoba. In September of 2019 at the 21<sup>st</sup> Manitoba Tourism Awards presentation, the event was declared the most innovative tourist attraction in the province.

Farming also employs most of the people in St. Labre today. There are close to 4000 acres being farmed, and Moonshadow Holsteins produces 2.6% of Manitoba's milk. Those living in St. Labre for the peace and quiet enjoy snowmobiling, ATV'ing, and trapping.





## String Lights - Light displays are a great way to decorate and get into the holiday spirit. If you're replacing any of

and get into the holiday spirit. If you're replacing any of your lights this year, a reminder that lights do NOT belong in your blue bags. If they are still in good condition, consider donating them to a second-hand store.

*Styrofoam* - Over the holidays, there is going to be a lot of foam packaging (Styrofoam) with all those new purchases. In Manitoba, foam packaging is NOT accepted for recycling in your blue bags. Try to avoid using it if possible and look for recyclable alternatives when sending gifts.

*Plastic Cutlery* - A friendly reminder that single-use plastic plates and cutlery are NOT accepted in the blue bags for recycling. Try to avoid using them over the holiday season and try to use real dishes to serve food instead. It may take more time but the environment will thank you!

Wrapping Paper - Remember that not all wrapping paper is accepted in the blue bags. Wrapping paper that comes from a tree is accepted, but foil-lined wrapping paper and cellophane are NOT accepted. When you're wrapping gifts, keep some recyclable options in mind. Try wrapping gifts in a reusable material, such as newspaper, flyers, or cloth bags. Or, put your gift in a reusable bag so they can reuse the bag later.

One tip to see if your wrapping paper is recyclable is to crush your paper into a ball. If it stays bunched up, then it's probably recyclable!
