2022 Municipal Elections

With Election Day fast approaching, please keep in mind the following dates:

Notice of Nominations: September 14th to 20th

Nominations will be received for the offices of: Reeve and Councillor for Ward 1, Ward 2, Ward 3, and Ward 4; during regular business hours, Monday to Friday. The nomination deadline is September 20th, 2022 at 4:30 pm. Nominations cannot be accepted after this day.

To obtain a nomination paper, and/or candidate's declaration of qualification, contact the SEO (below).

Registration Deadline: September 20th

Municipal election candidates must register with the Senior Election Official (SEO) during the registration period before they may begin to accept contributions, incur expenses, fundraise or borrow money for their campaign.

Voters List - Revision Deadline: September 20th

The RM of Piney Voters List is open for changes and revisions. Any person who is eligible to vote in the RM of Piney can have changes or revisions made to the Voters List. Any person can request to have his/her name and address obscured from the Voters List.

September 28th: First day to apply in-person to vote by sealed envelope

October 15th: Advanced Poll from 8am to 8pm at the RM of Piney Council Chambers in Vassar

October 26th: Election Day from 8am to 8pm

Ward 1 & 3 Polling Station: Woodridge Hall Ward 2 Polling Station: Piney Hall Ward 3 Polling Station: Vassar Hall Ward 4 Polling Station: Sprague Hall

Qualifications to Vote:

- Must be a Canadian citizen;
- Must be at least 18 years of age on Election Day;
- Are a resident in the RM and/or registered owner of the property for at least six (6) months before Election Day;
- *A voter must vote in the ward they reside in, even if they are a landowner in more than one ward.

Transitioning Small Container Collection from Municipal to Retail Sites

Manitoba - 2022 to 2024

Between 2022 and 2024, the <23L container collection program will undergo a gradual change that will align it with other provinces, enabling farmers to bring back these containers to their local retail outlets.

The change is being phased in gradually to reduce the burden on retail and municipal services, and to increase convenience for farmers who can now bring the containers back to the retail outlets that they frequent.

Growers

Across Canada, farmers return used ag items like jugs to ag-retailers. This streamlines the process and brings it into alignment with other provinces. It simplifies the program since your ag retailer may already be accepting Cleanfarms materials and it makes it easier for your municipality since they won't need to look after extra items. Most of all, when you're thinking about which materials you want to bundle up to recycle, you know they're all going to the same place: your local ag retailer.

How does this work for growers?

- 1. Rinse & remove
 - Use chemical handler/ triple rinse/ pressure rinse
 - Remove paper booklets, and discard
- 2. Fill bag & close
 - Place rinsed containers in bag and securely close
 - Only one material type per bag (i.e., jugs)
- 3. Seed treatment containers
 - Caps are to remain securely ON
 - Place in a separate collection bag (note this is preferred for collection at municipal sites and required at retail sites and it make it easier for storage and transportation)
- 4. Return for recycling. Check with your retailer to see when you can begin returning to retail

How do you know where to bring your jugs?

For 2022: Please ask your local retailer if they have begun accepting jugs as many are participating in the program before municipal sites are phasing out. 2023 is the year where Manitoba and Alberta farmers will see the most change and we'll announce it with ads in local newspapers, on radio, social media and with posters at your ag retailer. Also, municipal sites that are no longer receiving materials will post signs long before they close.

Why is rinsing important?

- It meets the requirements of the Pest Control Products Act.
- It ensures no product is wasted.
- It improves health and safety practices in the community.
- Only clean plastic can be recycled efficiently.

Please note

Before containers can be accepted for recycling, they must be rinsed of all residue after use. Only dry, rinsed containers that are residue-free can be accepted at collection sites.

GET PREPARED FOR BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY!

It's back to school time! As school doors open, traffic gets a little heavier on our streets. School buses are on regular routes, and more people are walking, cycling or driving to school. Here are some tips to stay safe:

1) Observe School Zone Speeds

Although you should always obey posted speed limits, it is especially important during the school year. Children crossing the road on their way to and from school can easily get distracted and step into harm's way. Slowing down and being vigilant is crucial to keeping kids safe. Children are often out throughout the day at recess, lunch, and for certain classes, so it's important to drive slowly throughout the day.

2) Watch for Darting Children

Kids are small and easily distracted, and for drivers, this can create dangerous situations on the roads. Be vigilant and alert behind the wheel. You never know when a small child might step out from between parked cars or off a sidewalk.



3) School Buses

Most mishaps take place outside the bus. Make sure children wait well away from the road and stay back until the school bus makes a full stop and the doors open. Explain that they must walk at least three metres (10 feet) away when crossing in front of the bus so the driver can see them. When driving your car near a school bus please note that extra caution is needed. You should **NEVER** pass a school bus when the signal lights are flashing. All traffic must STOP when meeting a school bus with its lights flashing.

School Bus Safety Week

The third full week of October is observed as School Bus Safety Week in Manitoba. Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning bases its annual theme on the National Association of Pupil Transportation (NAPT) poster contest theme. Typically, this theme is directed at a specific group (e.g. students; the motoring public). The week is an opportunity for students to receive school bus ridership training; for reminding parents and the motoring public to be particularly careful around school bus vehicles; and, for school divisions to examine their pupil transportation practices. Although the school bus safety week theme changes annually, one message remains constant – be aware and be safe around the school bus.

Well that felt like the guickest summer of all time didn't it? Just like that we're looking at fall, and preparing to close up our seasonal cabins for the year. This seems like a really good time to remind cabin owners to never leave firearms in your cabin year round. If you're closing up for the season, take your firearms home with you. Don't leave them in the closet, and don't put them under your bed, take them home and store them properly. We don't need stolen firearms ending up on the streets, because that's where they go! Make sure you put away, and lock up all property of value. If you're leaving an Off Road Vehicle as an example, take the battery out, and lock it up out of site from the roadway. Make your property as unattractive to thieves as possible, because they're always looking for an easy score. While we are on this topic, I'm still hearing from my officers that they are being approached by members of the public to report "Suspicious Vehicles" days, or in some cases weeks, after the incident happened. This doesn't help us, or help you! Please... if you see something call it in to the Sprague RCMP when it's happening. It's our best chance to catch some of these people looking for things to steal. Don't call the non emergency number... call the emergency number at (204) 437-2222. We need that information and vehicle description right away! You are the eyes, and ears out there. In the words of Jerry Maguire "Help Me... Help YOU"!

Storing and Transporting Firearms

Be safe! Prevent firearms accidents!

It is important to store, transport and display firearms safely to prevent accidents and deter loss or theft.

These rules apply to individuals. There are different rules for businesses.

Storing Firearms Safely

Unload and lock your firearms!

Store the **ammunition** separately or lock it up. It can be stored in the same locked container as the firearms.

Non-Restricted Firearms

 Attach a secure locking device, such as a trigger lock or cable lock (or remove the bolt) so the firearms cannot be fired; or



 Lock the firearms in a cabinet, container or room that is difficult to break into.





Restricted and Prohibited Firearms

 Attach a secure locking device so the firearms cannot be fired and lock them in a cabinet, container or room that is difficult to break into; or





- Lock the firearms in a vault, safe or room that was built or modified specifically to store firearms safely.
- For automatic firearms, also remove the bolts or bolt carriers (if removable) and lock them in a separate room that is difficult to break into.

Transporting Firearms Safely

Non-Restricted Firearms

Non-restricted firearms must be unloaded during transportation.

Restricted and Prohibited Firearms

- Unload the firearms; and
- Attach secure locking devices to the firearms; and
 - Lock the firearms in a sturdy, non-transparent container; **and**
- Remove the bolts or bolt carriers from any automatic firearms (if removable);
 - Obtain an Authorization to Transport (call 1-800-731-4000)

Remember

Don't forget to renew your firearms licence before it expires.
