2021/2022 Overdue Taxes

Tax Sale Processing Deadline: Friday, March 31st

RM taxes for 2022 were due on October 31st. If you happened to miss the deadline and also have 2021 taxes still owing on your property, your property will incur tax sale costs if not paid by March 31st, 2023.

For all rate payers who have 2021 and 2022 taxes owing, a letter will be issued to you later this month stating what you owe for 2021, including arrears and penalties. This amount is due by Friday, March 31st, 2023. The letter will not state the amount due for 2022 taxes since only 2021 needs to be paid in order for the property to not incur additional tax sale costs. Commencing April 1st, 2023, tax sale costs will be added to your property as well as monthly penalties.

Economic Development

Attracting the Right Kind of Development

Since creating a formal, staffed economic development partnership in 2019, the RMs of Piney and Stuartburn have consistently heard from residents that they know development is needed in the region, but they don't want the negative impacts that can come with development.

That's why the focus of Sunrise Corner Economic Development has always been on the balance between building sustainable communities and maintaining the wonderful quality of life we all love. We are doing that by working towards attracting the right kind of development.

One of the major projects we started in late 2022 that will continue throughout 2023 is an investment readiness assessment and business attraction strategy. This project will determine our region's capacity to be "investment ready" and develop a strategy to explore, attract, respond and successfully secure business investment best suited to our location. The project goals are to fully understand our region's strengths to be able to attract business investment to sustainably develop our region while maintaining our exceptional rural quality of life.

Our initial findings have determined six key sectors that we will focus on attracting investment in opportunities such as:

- Outdoor Recreation and Tourism: experiential tourism, agri-tourism, nature-based accommodations, water-based recreation, hospitality and destination development
- **Forestry:** pulp and paper production, timber processing, small-scale woodworking
- Manufacturing: peat moss production and application, pre-fabrication and modular construction, furniture product manufacturing
- Agriculture, Food & Beverage: specialty crops, plant-based proteins and microgreen production, craft beverages and distillers
- Technology-based Small Business: digital marketing, photography, videography, environmental technology consulting, online enterprise support, data centre hosting
- Residential Development: seniors housing, duplex/townhouse development, temporary accommodations (hotels, inns, bed and breakfast), seasonal accommodations

To truly understand which opportunities we should be promoting, we will be engaging community members, industry and local experts to help us refine our opportunity profiles. Early in the new year, we'll be posting an online survey and conducting roundtable discussions with targeted groups for each of our six key sectors. If you'd like to be involved in one or more of our sector focus groups, please let me know. Look forward to working with you to sustainably develop our region to reach its full potential.

Happy New Year! 2023 has arrived, and so has the snow! If you're the owner, or operator of a snowmobile, you have to be happy with the amount of snow we've received to date. If you don't own a snowblower... you're probably not as happy about the snow! While we're talking about snowmobiles, let's make sure that we're making good choices when using them. That means not drinking and driving, travelling at a safe speed, and making sure your machine is properly registered and insured. Stay off private property, and stick to designated routes or trails. If you're using a groomed trail, make sure you have a snowpass! Those trails don't groom themselves. As always, make sure you have emergency gear with you, and let someone know where you're going to be riding for the day. If you have a break down or an emergency situation, we'd sure like to have a starting point to come and find you!

Phone scammers are very active this time of year! Be aware that unsolicited phone calls from people asking for personal information, are very likely scammers. Never provide personal information, and if you're not sure if the call is legitimate or not, call the Sprague RCMP! It costs you nothing, and one phone call to us could save you a lot of time, frustration, and money.

Slow Down, Move Over, It's The Law!

In 2011 the Slow Down, Move Over law was created under section 109.1 of Manitoba's Highway Traffic Act (HTA). The law requires drivers to slow down and move over when they see a vehicle pulled over at the side of the road with their emergency lights flashing. These include emergency vehicles, tow trucks, and construction/maintenance vehicles.

If the posted speed limit is <u>less than 80 km/h</u> motorists are required to slow down to 40 km/h.

If the posted speed limit is <u>80 km/h</u> or <u>higher</u> motorists are required to slow down to <u>60 km/h</u>.

Be Prepared This Winter!

When winter arrives, we can have a difficult time changing our driving habits to suit the conditions of snow and sleet. Inappropriate speed, reduced visibility, following too closely, sudden acceleration or braking, and poor vehicle maintenance are all reasons why Manitobans report more crashes in winter months.

Slow Down

Slowing down will maintain traction and decrease your total stopping distance. Posted speed limits are the maximum recommended speed for ideal conditions only.



Severe Conditions

Conditions on Manitoba highways during winter can quickly turn dangerous. Planning ahead may save your life. Check for weather forecasts and road condition alerts by visiting <u>Manitoba511.ca</u> for road information. Fill up on gas, anti-freeze and windshield washer fluid and travel with a fully-charged phone if you have one.

Emergency Supplies

Keep a cold-weather survival kit in your vehicle.













If Stranded

If you are stranded, call for help, turn on the vehicle's four-way flashers, and remain in your vehicle until help arrives. Ensure that your tail-pipe is not getting covered or blocked with snow to reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.

How much sleep?

Getting enough sleep

isn't only about total hours of sleep. It's also important to get good-quality sleep on a regular schedule so you feel rested when you wake up.

Of course, everyone's sleep needs vary a lot, but in general, recommendations are:

< 1 year = 12-16 hours/day 1-2 years = 11-14 hours/day 3-5 years = 10-13 hours/day 6-12 years = 9-12 hours/day

13-18 years = 8-10 hours 18+ = 7 or more
