### **Sprague RCMP**

With the beginning of summer now in full swing, the RM of Piney is experiencing an increase of users on our roadways. In turn, we have seen an uptick in traffic collisions. Some of which, could have been prevented. In one

instance, we responded to a motorist who drove into the back of some farm equipment that was situated along the shoulder of the highway. Luckily, no one was seriously hurt.

Distracted driving is anything that diverts your attention from the road. Being distracted for even just two seconds can cause a crash! Distracted driving is preventable so please don't be "that person" who is responding to text messages while driving, or checking out the football scores. If you are caught using a hand-operated device (such as a cell phone) while you drive, you'll receive a three-day licence suspension. Upon conviction, you would also receive a \$672.00 fine. If caught a subsequent time, your licence would be suspended for seven days.

If you're a passenger and your driver is sending text messages or scrolling on their phone, ask them to put their phone away! You'll be saving them from a hefty fine and suspension. On average, one in three deaths on Manitoba roads involves a distracted driver. Protect your friends, family, and all users of the roadways!

#### Results: Introducing the Shared Legacy Partnership

After three years of consultation and planning, we are thrilled to officially announce the Shared Legacy Partnership. Our goal is to help advance understanding of the wonder of Manitoba's Tall Grass Prairie Natural Area, its relationship with agriculture, and the natural heritage that benefits all residents.

This is a cooperative working group led by the Rural Municipality of Stuartburn and The Nature Conservancy of Canada (NCC) along with partners Sunrise Corner Economic Development and Province of Manitoba. We have three key areas of focus:

- **Nature**: creating and delivering a strategy for sharing our unique nature in the RM of Stuartburn with future generations.
- **Culture**: engaging with local producers, landowners, Stuartburn residents, and Indigenous communities to guide our direction.
- **Economy**: pursuing "win-win" solutions that work for the ecosystem, landowners, residents, economy, & communities.

A hidden gem centered right here in Sunrise Corner, the Tall Grass Prairie Natural Area covers 445,628 hectares and supports one of the largest and last remaining tall-grass prairie landscapes in North America. It forms the northern end of an international conservation corridor comprised of protected and managed prairies, wetlands, forests and streams within a working landscape that includes conservation, agriculture and ecotourism. The tall-grass prairie is home to 28 listed Canadian species at risk (SAR), such as the monarch butterfly, the globally rare Poweshiek skipperling butterfly, and the Western prairie fringed orchid. Many of these species depend on the tall-grass prairie for their very survival.

Shared Legacy Partnership invites you to learn more about the tall-grass prairie and the species at risk that call it home. We will be participating in Vita Canada Day festivities on July 1st, with a float in the parade and a booth at the vendor market to answer questions. We will also be offering two guided tours at NCC's Agassiz Trail west of Vita to view the spectacular western prairie fringed orchid that will be in full bloom at that time; it's the only place you can see these unique perennials in Canada. ## **Fire Prevention**

In Manitoba, there is an average of nearly 600 wildfires every year. Many threaten homes, businesses and farms in addition to the damage caused on the landscape. About half are caused by human activity. All Manitobans can take steps to reduce the risk of starting or spreading wildfires. These include:

• checking current weather conditions and the risk level for wildfires, which are regularly posted fire situations reports at Manitoba.ca/wildfire and at many/all provincial park entrances;

- following all municipal and provincial orders related to burning permits, open-air fires and crop residue burning;
- locating fire pits and burn barrels away from the home and keeping them under constant supervision if used;
- using designated sites for campfires, when permitted, and ensuring they are fully extinguished;
- disposing of cigarettes and other materials safely, which includes using vehicle ashtrays instead of throwing out a window;
- avoiding the use of all-terrain vehicles in areas at risk, as they can ignite brush from their exhaust systems;
- checking farm and lawn equipment to ensure spark arresters are working properly;
- ensuring chimneys and gas fireplaces meet all applicable regulations and building code requirements, with regular inspections if appropriate;
- never setting off fireworks without the appropriate permit;
- reporting wildfires immediately to 1-800-782-0076 (toll-free); and
- reporting any information about arsons to the appropriate police agency.

All homes should have shovels, rakes, axes, garden hoses, sprinklers and ladders available to help suppress wildfires. The Home Owner's FireSmart Manual is also available to help Manitobans identify and reduce wildfire risks on their properties.
