## **Fall Hunting Lease**

By-Law No. 123/2017

As of August 15th, you can purchase a Fall Hunting Lease that will allow you to hunt on RM land from September 1st to November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2023. Leases are for hunting purposes only; recreational use will not be allowed. No permanent structures may be erected on municipal land; only temporary structures will be allowed and must be removed before the end of the lease. No trees are to be removed and no trails are to be made on RM land. Vehicles are only permitted on land during the retrieval of harvested game.

The cost of a Fall Hunting Lease is \$500.00 for one (1) permit that allows up to five (5) individuals permission to access one parcel of RM land during one regular season.

## **New Landowners**

2023 Property Taxes

The RM of Piney property tax bills are printed in May by the Province and were mailed out in July. Depending when you purchased your property, your tax bill may not have been changed by the province in time and therefore you may not receive a copy of your bill. Please note it is the landowner's responsibility to contact the RM office to confirm whether taxes are owing, even if a tax bill has not been received.

2023 Property Taxes are due on Tuesday, October 31<sup>st</sup> by 4:30pm. If the payment is not met by this deadline, the total amount left owing will be subject to a 1.25% penalty on the first of each month, following the due date, until the taxes are paid in full. Any added and/or reduction tax bills for 2022 and/or 2023 will be mailed out shortly. If you receive an added/reduction tax bill from us, read the cover letter supplied, as it will state your new total owing that will be due on October 31st, 2023.

# **PROTECTIVE SERVICES**



### **Sprague RCMP**

In recent months, several people have attended the homes of Sprague RCMP members to seek police assistance. I would like to take a few minutes to explain to everyone that you will get the best, and most efficient police response by using the phone. Firstly, we have telecoms/911 operators who are ready to take your call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They are trained to gather the necessary information in great detail, and very quickly. They proceed to dispatch the gathered information to the closest on duty police officers over the police radio so they can all hear the call. This is especially helpful if it's a serious call so multiple units can get rolling. The telecoms operators even send the location of the calls straight to the map we have on our in-car computers!

Prior to starting our shifts, we need to gather and load up all of the equipment that we require to respond to a call. This can be a very lengthy process. We have several items on our duty belts to load. Such as: our service pistol, magazines, pepper spray, extendable baton, taser, portable radio and hand cuffs. We also need to load and secure other important equipment into our police vehicles. Such as, additional firearms, body armour, approved screening devices and our duty bags. Our duty bags contain several important items including the relevant paperwork we may require on a call, bug spray, exhibit bags, and personal protective equipment that we must carry with us at all times.

To recap: If there is no police officer at the detachment, you will get a better and faster response by phoning as opposed to attending one of our homes. If you come to my home in the middle of the night, I would have to find my pants, a pen and paper and ask you a bunch of questions to gather the required information. I would have to find my keys, go to the detachment and put on my uniform. I would have to go to the secure room and load up everything that I need. I would need to conduct a pre-patrol inspection of my vehicle, and log in with telecoms over the police radio. There is also the high likelihood that I simply wouldn't be available. Enjoying a "beverage", or being alone with the kids while my better half is on a well-deserved night out.

In all seriousness, public safety is of the utmost importance to us. In considering the above, and in order to provide the RM of Piney with the fastest and most efficient police response possible, I have asked that all RCMP members working out of the Sprague office direct any person who attends their home, to call one the numbers below.

For all non-emergency matters including Criminal Record Checks, contact the Sprague RCMP Detachment at (204) 437-2041. Should you require immediate Police assistance, call (204) 437-2222 or 911 in the case of an emergency.



Recently, the RM of Piney has been noticing that recycling stats have been significantly declining for all three waste disposal site locations. If we each do our part by recycling, we are making another step in the right direction of keeping our environment clean and safe.

Here is a list of other less frequently recycled items you may find in your kitchen that can also be recycled:

- 1. Beverage cartons from milk, juice, and soup
- 2. Food tins, sweets, and biscuit tins
- 3. Milk and yogurt bottles
- 4. Detergent and liquid soap bottles
- 5. Tissue boxes
- 6. Soap dispenser bottles
- 7. Sauce and jam jars
- 8. Vinegar and oil bottles
- 9. Plastic disinfectant bottles
- 10. Household cleaner bottles
- 11. Paper towel and toilet paper rolls

Lids and labels do not need to be removed; just ensure they are empty. Plastic, glass, and metal containers can be cleaned if you have the time. A quick rinse is always appreciated and helps avoid contaminating other materials, reduces unpleasant odors and the development of mold.

Recycling will help better the environment, even if it is one can at a time!

## HAVE YOU NOTICED BROWN TREES IN YOUR AREA?

Manitoba Conservation Information Sheet:

#### Management

Outbreaks often last two to four years. Weather conditions, parasites and predators are contributing factors to population decline. A reduction in pollen cone production following sustained severe defoliation often causes population collapse. Without the nutritious pollen food source there is a high mortality rate in young larvae.

Insecticide application is sometimes necessary to protect high value forests against top-kill, timber volume loss and mortality during severe outbreaks. At present, a bacterial insecticide, *Bacillus thuringiensis* subspecies *kurstaki* (Btk) and tebufenozide (Mimic) are the only insecticides registered in Canada for jack pine budworm control. Timing of application coincides with the elongation of the shoots and formation of the needles.

### **Description of Life Stages**

The adult moth has a wingspan of 15-to-28 millimeters (1/2 to 1 inch). The rust-coloured forewings have silverywhite patches. The hind wings are grey-brown.

Light green eggs are deposited in long masses on the needles. Approximately 40 eggs are laid in two rows which overlap, similar to shingles on a roof.



A mature larva is 20-to-22 millimetres long ( <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> to 1 inch). Its head is shiny reddish-brown to black. The reddish-brown body has yellowish sides and two rows of white dots along the back. There are six or seven stages called instars during larval development.

# Jack Pine Budworm





ack pine budworm, Choristoneura pinus Freeman, is a destructive insect that attacks pines in central and northwestern Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan and in the Great Lakes region. Severe outbreaks seriously affect the growth and quality of vast areas of pine.

This insect prefers jack pine, but red pine, Scots pine, lodgepole and occasionally white pine and black spruce that grow with jack pine can also be attacked.



The pupa (transition stage from larva to moth) is approximately 12 millimeters long (½ inch) and is pale green when first formed. Later it becomes dark reddish-brown.



## Life Cycle

The female moth lays its eggs through mid July to early August. The eggs hatch in seven to 10 days. The larvae emerge and spin a silken cover under bark scales or between pine needles. Then the larvae molt without feeding and remain under the silken cover until the following spring.

They emerge in late May and early June when the male cones of jack pine produce pollen. Young larvae feed initially on pollen. The majority then move to the new foliage when it is well developed. Needles are seldom consumed entirely, but are often clipped at the base and webbed together. The accumulation of this feeding debris gives pine trees a scorched appearance in mid-summer.

Feeding lasts for approximately six weeks. Pupae develop among the needles or between webbed shoots from early to late July. Moths emerge in July and early August, mate and lay eggs. There is one generation per year.

### Damage

During light and moderate infestations, damage is restricted to a partial loss of new foliage, particularly in the upper crown of the tree. When populations reach epidemic proportions, much of the current foliage is destroyed.

Trees may die after two to three years of severe defoliation. Top-kill, reduced tree health and substantial growth loss are the common forms of damage. Reduced vigour makes trees susceptible to secondary diseases and insects. In heavily infested forests, tree mortality or serious deformity can occur.
