2023 Recreation Grants

All applications for Recreation Grants must be received by the RM of Piney by September 30th, 2023.

Home Sharing / Short-Term Rentals

Home sharing or short-term rentals means the renting out of a dwelling (cabin, trailer or home), or a room within a dwelling, on a platform such as Airbnb or VRBO for guests to stay in.

If you wish to rent your home, cabin, trailer, or room within a dwelling, you must apply for a Conditional Use Permit. Only properties zoned as Rural Seasonal, Rural Transitional and General Development, are permitted to do so with an approved Conditional Use.

Home sharing/short-term rentals are NOT A PERMITTED USE for properties that are zoned Agriculture and Rural.

I can hardly believe I am already submitting September's newsletter! Where did the summer go? Now that autumn is sneaking up on us, the population in the RM of Piney will start to decrease. Many of you will be packing up your belongings, and heading back out to your primary homes. I thought this would be a good time to remind everyone to ensure all your valuables are removed from your cabins/cottages to prevent break and enters/thefts. In particular, I encourage everyone to remove firearms and alcohol as they always seem to be hot ticket items.

I would also like to encourage everyone to ensure your cabins/cottages are checked on and maintained on a regular basis over the winter months. If you can, leave a spot light on. Posting a sign such as "smile you're on camera" can also be a deterrent.

If you have the time, I suggest that you look up the "Broken Window Theory". To summarize, the broken window theory explains that one broken window will lead to many more windows being broken. A property that appears to be well maintained stands a better chance of being left alone.

RM of Piney Fire Service

In the past couple months, our volunteer fire fighters have been receiving fire calls either at their homes or on their private phone lines. Some recent fire calls were also made to the Sprague Fire Station's landline. If there is an emergency and you feel fire services are needed, please call 911. Please do not contact our volunteer fire fighters directly as they cannot attend a call to your home unless it has been dispatched by 911.





We have recently become aware of a new Tier 1 weed in our RM. Red bartsia has been found primarily in and around the town of Piney. As per the Noxious Weeds Act, all Tier 1 must be destroyed. Red bartsia can be controlled by using 2.4D and cultivation.

Red bartsia does not persist under cultivation. For this reason, it is seldom a problem in cereals and special crops. The weed is, however, a serious concern in hay land and in pastures. In hay fields, the tiny seedlings grow rapidly after the first cut of hay has been removed. Plants begin flowering two to three weeks later, making the danger of seed contamination in the second cut a serious concern. In pasture, the weed is not grazed by cattle, and with time heavy infestations spread through the field.

Cultivation in combination with growing a competitive crop will limit red bartsia infestations. This may not always be a viable alternative since the weed often infests areas not suitable for tillage because of stoniness or poor drainage.

The weed is susceptible to either 2,4-D amine or 2,4-D LV ester sprayed at a rate of 0.6 L/acre product (500 g/L formulations). On roadsides and in pastures, spraying should commence as soon as the plants appear. Recheck sprayed areas in mid- to late summer and respray if new seedlings have germinated. In hay fields with no legumes, treat affected areas with 0.6 L/acre product of 2,4-D (500 g/L formulations) within 10 days after the first cut.

There are currently no chemical recommendations that will selectively control red bartsia in grass/legume mixes without damaging the legumes. Research currently in progress has shown that Sencor and Basagran both show potential for controlling the weed in alfalfa, but further work must be done to establish rates, stages of application and grazing restrictions. Growers with legumes in their hay or pasture mixes should pay close attention to bordering road allowances or fence lines so that control measures can be taken before red bartsia encroaches into the field. Evidence indicates that a well managed, well fertilized crop will effectively crowd out red bartsia.

LOOK OUT FOR WILD PIGS

> Wild pigs are WIDESPREAD in Manitoba

What's the Big Deal With Wild Pigs?

WILD PIGS:

Contaminate water sources with E. coli and other bacteria, putting public safety and health at risk

Damage natural habitats, displacing wildlife and negatively impacting biodiversity

Uproot and trample crops, destroying farmers' hard work

Can carry up to 89 diseases, threatening farm livestock

Reproduce alarmingly fast, with females giving birth to four to 12 piglets up to twice a year

Do your part to eradicate this invasive species

REPORT SIGHTINGS OR SIGNS.

Wild pigs pose a threat to rural Manitoba. If you see evidence of wild pigs in your community, such as rooting, tracks, wallows or scat, the best thing you can do is report it. Help your neighbours by sharing the information you see here. If we all do our part, we can eradicate wild pigs in Manitoba.

SHOULD I HUNT WILD PIGS?

NO! Conventional hunting disperses wild pigs over broader areas, changes movement patterns, and can harm trapping efforts.

WHAT SHOULD I LOOK FOR?

Wild pigs come in different sizes and colours, but are mostly brown or black with coarse, bristly hair. They can grow 3 feet high and 5 feet long. Males typically have larger heads and tusks.



Rooting – This includes plants and crops.



Tracks — Rounded, blunt-toed tracks appear in mud patches and wet soil and are often mistaken for deer tracks.



Wallows — These are wetland depressions wild pigs make to coat themselves in mud, damaging surrounding habitats.



Tree and post rubs — Wild pigs will use trees, posts, and fences to scrape off excess mud or dirt after wallowing.



Nests or beds – Groups of wild pigs build habitats out of cattails and other wetland grasses.



"Scat" — Wild pig feces resembles that of dogs and may contain acorns, grains, animal hair, or feathers.




