On behalf of the Sprague RCMP detachment, I would like to wish everyone a Happy Holiday. Some of you may be travelling a long distance to visit your loved ones, or perhaps family members will be coming to visit you.

Speaking of travel, as you are likely aware, there is an increased risk on our roadways now that winter weather is upon us! Even though we may feel superhuman with fresh winter tires on our rims, it is still important to be extra cautious over the winter months. Check the weather and road conditions before you depart, and plan accordingly. The road conditions can change drastically in a short period of time. Visibility is a factor that you also have to consider. I don't know about you, but the times I've been caught in a snow storm, it's like piloting the millennium falcon through space. All you see are white flakes coming at you fast and furious like the stars.

Seriously though, if you decide to risk it out in adverse conditions, you aren't only taking the risk for yourself, but you are also forcing the hand of emergency services, tow truck operators, and that good Samaritan who stops to help. You would also be putting family members at risk who will without a doubt be coming out to help you. There is no shame in missing a hockey practice, or rescheduling a date with your pets' groomer.

In the event you do end up stuck in a snowbank or ditch over the winter season, ensure you have some extra winter items in case you need them. Such as a first aid kit, clothing, blankets, flashlight, snacks, hand warmers, and an extra pair of boots in case your feet get wet while trying to shovel your way out. Above all else, don't panic!

We recently had someone turn in some jewelry that was located on a trail at an undisclosed location in the RM of Piney. If this belongs to you, please reach out to us. You will be required to provide us with a description of the items in order for us to return them.

Slow Down, Move Over, It's The Law!

In 2011 the Slow Down, Move Over law was created under section 109.1 of Manitoba's Highway Traffic Act (HTA). The law requires drivers to slow down and move over when they see a vehicle pulled over at the side of the road with their emergency lights flashing.

Vehicles that you must slow down for include police cars, fire trucks, ambulances, tow trucks, and construction and/or maintenance vehicles.



If the posted speed limit is <u>less than 80 km/hr</u> motorists are required to slow down to <u>40 km/hr</u>. If the posted speed limit is <u>80 km/hr or higher</u> motorists are required to slow down to <u>60 km/hr</u>.

On multi-lane highways, drivers must also move to the next lane if able to do so safely and pass only if it is safe. The fine for failing to comply with any of the requirements is \$298 and two demerits.

For more details refer to the Manitoba Highway Traffic Act.

Winter Driving

Winter is quickly approaching and with that, comes the change in road conditions. Help prevent any accidents this winter with a few of the following reminders:

Slow down

Slowing down will maintain traction and decrease your total stopping distance. Posted speed limits are the maximum recommended speed for ideal conditions only.

Leave earlier

Avoid the temptation to drive too fast for conditions by giving yourself extra travel time.

Brake sooner

Brake sooner than you normally would to allow more space to stop. Risk of injury is high at intersections where ice tends to build up, and where there may be pedestrians or other vehicles sliding into your path.

Leave distance between vehicles

Leave plenty of following distance between you and the vehicle in front. The recommended safe distance in ideal conditions is four seconds; on highways allow for six seconds. In poor conditions, leave more time.

Don't use cruise control

If your vehicle loses traction, cruise control will cause the wheels to rapidly spin and accelerate at the worst possible time.


