## RM OF PINEY FOREST TOURS CONSIDERED A SUCCESS

The RM of Piney embarked on a program to raise awareness of our local forest resources. Three events were held, each with a different theme. Participants came from across the region including Steinbach and surrounding communities.

The first tour focused on forest ecology and management, where participants looked at the many values of the forest including oxygen production, carbon uptake, wildlife habitat, wild foods such as berries and mushrooms, plus many more. Forest management techniques were compared between Crown (publicly owned forests) and privately owned forests, or woodlots. Discussions centered on our local forest resources as an 'economic engine' that provide not only traditional forest products such as saw logs and pulpwood, but also the fact that they have tremendous tourism potential.

The second tour focused on the FireSmart<sup>TM</sup> program, where landowners learned about different approaches to make their property less vulnerable to wildfires, such as clearing brush and long grass away from buildings, keeping firewood supplies away from dwellings, and having a buffer zone around the house of at least 10 metres free from combustible trees such Jack pine or White spruce. The local Wildfire Response crew made a guest appearance to demonstrate their forest firefighting equipment and discuss the strategies they use to fight wildfires.

The final tour offered participants an experience in 'Forest Bathing', which is a technique that people can use to connect to the forest in ways that enhances relaxation and reduces stress. It involves training oneself to 'downshift' from a stressful day by slowly walking in the forest and using all of one's senses to really become aware of the sights, sounds, and smells of the forest. Research has proven that this technique can lower blood pressure, reduce the heart rate, and decrease levels of cortisol (the main stress hormone). During this tour, participants were given bundles of seedlings to take home and plant as a memory of all they had learned and experienced.

#### **Ensuring Safety on Rural School Bus Routes**

As the new school year begins, it's crucial to address the unique safety challenges faced by students and drivers on rural roads. With gravel and dusty conditions, both students waiting for the bus and drivers navigating these roads must be vigilant to ensure everyone's safety.

### **Safety Tips for Students**

- 1. Wait in a Safe Spot: Always stand at least 10 feet away from the road while waiting for the bus. This distance helps avoid accidents caused by passing vehicles or the bus itself.
- 2. Be Visible: Wear bright or reflective clothing, during early morning or late afternoon hours when visibility is low.
- 3. Stay Alert: Avoid distractions like phones/headphones. Pay attention to your surroundings & the approaching bus.
- 4. Boarding the Bus: Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop and for the driver to signal that it's safe to board. Use the handrail to avoid slipping.

#### **Safety Tips for Drivers**

- 1. Slow Down: Reduce speed when approaching bus stops, especially on gravel where stopping distances are longer.
- 2. Stay Alert: Be on the lookout for children waiting by the roadside. They might be hidden by dust or other obstacles.
- 3. Follow the Law: Always stop when a school bus has its stop sign extended and lights flashing. This is a legal requirement and crucial for children's safety.
- 4. Maintain Distance: Keep a safe distance from the bus to allow for sudden stops and to avoid the dust cloud that can obscure visibility.




