2023/2024 Overdue Taxes

Tax Sale Processing Deadline: Monday, March 31st

2024 RM taxes were due on October 31st. If you happened to miss the deadline and have 2023 taxes still owing on your property, your property will incur tax sale costs if not paid by March 31st, 2025.

For all rate payers who have 2023 and 2024 taxes owing, a letter will be issued to you later this month stating what you owe for 2023, including arrears and penalties. This amount is due by Monday, March 31st, 2025. The letter will not state the amount due for 2024 taxes since only 2023 needs to be paid in order for the property to not incur additional tax sale costs. Come April 1st, tax sale costs will be added to your property as well as monthly penalties.

Piney Weed / Building District



Our 2024 building season was another strong year for building permits. We saw our third busiest year to date with 62 permits being pulled for 2024. This is a 55% increase over our normal averages for Piney building permits and shows that year after year our RM is continuously growing, this is the 3rd year in a row of above average permits. With the new sub-divisions in Woodridge and Sandilands I can see another strong year coming for 2025.

The 2024 road side spray program for noxious weeds saw it's challenges this year. We had a mild winter which turned into a cool spring, before finally getting a normal summer. This did see an effect on the growing season and our crew had to adjust accordingly. The "new" Tier 1 weed in our RM called Red Bartsia was discovered in the summer of 2023. This weed is very hard to control and mainly effects lawns, pasture and grazing lands, effecting our cattle producers and hay lands. The weed was mostly located in and around the town of Piney with a few spots in South Junction and Badger. This year it has now spread to include several PR roads (201,210 and PTH 89) and the towns of Woodridge, Sundown and Stuartburn. If you see this weed on your property please try to contain it to a small spot in order to help prevent further spread of the seeds.

Snowmobile Safety Tips

Check the weather

Check the weather forecast and trail conditions before going out. If it's frozen, windy, or there's a blizzard, you might want to reschedule.

Wear safety gear

Wear a full-face helmet and dress in layers to stay warm and dry. Snowmobile suits, jackets, bibs, gloves, and mittens should repel water and cut the wind.

Ride safely

Ride at a safe speed and slow down at night, in poor visibility near residential areas, and on the roadway.

Stay on the trails

Stay on designated trails and avoid riding off-trail. Riding off-trail can damage the environment and put you in danger.

Stay alert

Focus on the trail ahead of you, not the snowmobile in front.

Carry an emergency kit

Carry an emergency kit, extra fuel, snacks, a tow rope, and a communication device.

Get permission

Get permission from the landowner before riding on private land.

Take a safety course

An approved safety course will prepare you on how to ride safely and responsibly.

Don't drink or use drugs

Never ride under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Notify someone

Before you leave, let someone know where you'll be riding and when you expect to return.

Permanent Closure of Piney Pinecreek Border Airport

Effective midnight, December 26th, 2024, the Piney Pinecreek Border Airport will cease operation. There will be no further maintenance or operational activities taking place at the airport. This notice is to inform the public and all air travelers of this change in operations.

The decision to close the airport follows the termination of the operations agreement between the Rural Municipality of Piney and the State of Minnesota. This agreement, which included shared costs for critical upgrades estimated at \$2.5 million, was deemed unsustainable for the municipality due to fiscal constraints.

For many years, the Piney Pinecreek Border Airport has been a vital part of our community, facilitating medical transfers and supporting local air travel. Despite the closure, discussions between the RM of Pinev and the State of Minnesota are ongoing, and there is still a possibility of finding a solution to continue operations in the future.
