## MONTHLY REMINDERS

### Council Meetings

Regular council meetings are held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesdays of every month and Committee of the Whole meetings, where resolutions are not passed, are held on the 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday of every month. All meetings commence at 10am and are held in the Council Chambers in Vassar.

### 2024/2025 Overdue Taxes

**Tax Sale Processing Deadline: Tuesday, March 31<sup>st</sup>**

If you missed the tax deadline of October 31<sup>st</sup>, 2025, and have 2024 taxes still owing, your property will incur tax sale costs if not paid by March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2026.

For all rate payers who have 2024 and 2025 taxes owing, a letter will be issued to you later this month stating what you owe for 2024, including arrears and penalties. This amount is due by **Tuesday, March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2026**. The letter will not state the amount due for 2025 taxes since only 2024 needs to be paid in order for the property to not incur additional tax sale costs. Come April 1<sup>st</sup>, tax sale costs will be added to your property as well as monthly penalties.

### Community Grant Submissions Due

Grant submissions made by an eligible community organization for 2026, must be submitted to the RM by **February 15<sup>th</sup>, 2026**. For more information on what grants are available and for submission forms, please visit our website under Recreation Policies or call the RM office.



### Piney Weed / Building District

2025 was another strong year for building permits. We saw our fourth busiest year to date with 63 permits being pulled for 2025. This 55% increase over our normal averages for Piney building permits, shows that each year our RM is continuously growing. Building permits are required for:

- Construction of any building/structure over 108 sq ft;
- Any building (house, shed, etc) being moved into the RM;
- Attached and/or detached garages and/or carports;
- Decks 24" above grade and/or located in the front yard;
- Temporary buildings (incl. temporarily (re)located);
- Demolition of whole or part of a building;
- Renovations projects that affect the structural integrity of a building and proper venting of plumbing.

The 2025 roadside spray program for noxious weeds had its challenges this year. Our mild winter quickly turned into a very dry spring, before finally getting a normal summer. This did see an effect on the growing season and our crew had to adjust accordingly. The "new" Tier 1 weed in our RM called Red Bartsia was discovered in 2023 is very hard to control and effects lawns, pasture/grazing lands, effecting our cattle producers and hay lands. The weed is mostly located in and around the town of Piney with a few spots in South Junction and Badger. If you see this weed on your property, please try to contain it to a small spot to help prevent further spread of the seeds.

### One-Time Recovery Benefit Available for Wildfire Evacuees

*A message from the Province of Manitoba*

On December 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Manitoba Government issued a media release announcing that the Manitoba government will match the Canadian Red Cross donations to support wildfire evacuees and affected businesses.

All evacuated Manitobans are eligible for a one-time recovery benefit funded through donations made to the Canadian Red Cross during the summer wildfires. Registered evacuees who previously received emergency financial assistance will be eligible for recovery support of \$120 per adult & \$65 per child.

## PROTECTIVE SERVICES

### Sprague RCMP

Fraud and scams continue to affect seniors & residents of rural Manitoba including the RM of Piney. The Sprague RCMP have seen an increase this past year in numerous types of scams. Scammers often target people they believe may be more trusting, live alone, or have limited access to in-person services. We regularly hear from victims who never expected to be scammed, and who are often embarrassed to report it. No one should feel ashamed. These scams are designed to deceive.

One of the most common scams involves phone calls claiming to be from the RCMP, Canada Revenue Agency, banks, or utility companies. Callers may threaten arrest, demand immediate payment, or say a loved one is in trouble and needs money right away. Police and government agencies do not demand payment over the phone and will never ask for gift cards, cryptocurrency, or wire transfers.

There has also been an increase in online marketplace and equipment-related scams. This can include fake farm equipment listings, rental scams, or requests for deposits on vehicles, trailers, or property that do not exist. Scammers often use stolen photos and pressure buyers to act quickly.

Romance scams continue to cause serious financial loss, particularly among seniors. Scammers may spend weeks or months building trust through phone calls, emails, or social media before asking for money. These requests often involve emergencies, investments, or travel costs. Once money is sent, it is very difficult to recover.

The best defense against fraud is to slow down and verify. Do not act on urgent requests for money or personal info. Hang up the phone, do not click on suspicious links, and contact a trusted family member, friend, bank, or the Sprague RCMP detachment to confirm the situation. If something feels wrong, it usually is.

We encourage seniors and rural residents to report scams, even if no money was lost. Reporting helps police identify trends and warn others in the community. Talking openly about scams with family members, neighbours, and friends is one of the most effective ways to prevent victimization.

**Staying informed and taking time to verify requests can help protect you and your community from fraud. For all non-emergency matters, please contact the Sprague RCMP Detachment at (204) 437-2041. Until further notice, we will not be completing Criminal Record Checks. Please contact the Steinbach RCMP or your closest RCMP detachment to have them completed. Should you require immediate Police assistance you can call (204) 437-2222 or 911 in the case of an emergency.**
